# AMERICAN BEAUTYBERRY

#### Callicarpa americana

Height: ~3-8 ft fall and usually just as wide

<u>Shade</u>: Full to partial shade. Species intolerant to full shade.

<u>Conditions</u>: Fast growing shrub that produces edible magenta berries that wildlife love.

## **BLACK CHERRY**

#### Prunus serotina

<u>Height</u>: ~50-80 ft

Conditions: Full sun and moist soil preferred


<u>Comments</u>: This fast growing tree has vivid yellow fall colors, beautiful spring flowers, and delicious summer fruit.

<u>Fun Fact</u>: The fruit is edible, jelly and wines are often made from them.

### ELDERBERRY

#### Sambucus nigra ssp. canadensis

Height: ~12 ft

Growth: Fast grower

Conditions: Full sun if watered well

<u>Comments:</u> Shrub like tree that prefers moist but well drained soils.

Lifespan: 80-100 years

<u>Fun Fact</u>: The purple-black fruit is often used to make pies, jullies, wine, etc. Indigenous people used these fruit for medicinal purposes.

#### Prunus mexicana

<u>Height</u>: ~10- 30 ft

Conditions: Full sun preferred

<u>Comments</u>: This is a drought tolerant tree with fragrant, white, showy flowers that produces delicious plums humans and wildlife enjoy.
